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The purpose of this worksheet is to provide support for Office of IRB Administration (OIA) staff pre-reviewing research involving drugs. This worksheet, or equivalent, is to be used. It does not need to be completed or retained. Drug Applicability Does the activity involve any of the following? (Check all that apply) If "No" to both, Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations do not apply. In the United States: The use of a drug1 in one or more persons other than the use of an approved drug in the course of medical practice.2 Data regarding subjects or control subjects submitted to or held for inspection by FDA3. Investigational New Drug (IND) Requirements<sup>4</sup> (Check if "Yes." One must be "Yes." If all are "No" IND information is not complete.) The drug has a valid IND. (Complete Sections 3 and 4) The drug is exempt from the IND requirements (Complete Section 5) The research is conducted outside of the United States and is conducted under the Declaration of Helsinki (1989) and International Council for Harmonisation-Good Clinical Practice. IND Validation (Check if "Yes." At least one must be "Yes." If all are "No" IND cannot be validated.) Sponsor<sup>5</sup> protocol imprinted with the IND number. The plan for storage, control, and dispensing of the drug is adequate to ensure that only authorized investigators will use the drug and that they will use the drug only in subjects who have provided consent.6 IND Exemptions (Check if "Yes." All criteria for one category must be "Yes" to be met. If none are met, the drug is not exempt from an IND.) Category #1: Approved Drugs (21 CFR 312.2(b)(1)) The drug is lawfully marketed in the United States. The research is not intended to be reported to the FDA as a well-controlled study in support of a new indication for use nor intended to be used to support any other significant change in the labeling for the drug. The <u>research</u> is not intended to support a significant change in the advertising for the product. The research does not involve a route of administration or dosage level or use in a patient population or other factor that significantly increases the risks (or decreases the acceptability of the risks) associated with the use of the drug product. The investigator should provide evidence in the application to support this assertion. The <u>research</u> is conducted in compliance with the marketing limitations described in 21 CFR 312.7. Category #2: Serological Tests (21 CFR 312.2(b)(2)) A clinical investigation for an in vitro diagnostic<sup>7</sup> biological product that involves one or more of the following: (1) blood grouping serum; (2) reagent red blood cells; or (3) anti-human globulin. The diagnostic test is intended to be used in a diagnostic procedure that confirms the diagnosis made by another, medically established, diagnostic product or procedure.

- (A) articles recognized in the official United States Pharmacopoeia, official Homoeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or official National Formulary, or any supplement to any of them; and
- (B) articles intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in man or other animals; and
- (C) articles (other than food and dietary supplements) intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of man or other animals; and

(D) articles intended for use as a component of any article specified in clause (A), (B), or (C).

The diagnostic test is shipped in compliance with 21 CFR 312.160.

The vitro diagnostic (IVD) products are those reagents, instruments, and systems intended for use in the diagnosis of disease or other conditions, including a determination of the state of health, in order to cure, mitigate, treat, or prevent disease or its sequelae. Such products are intended for use in the collection, preparation, and examination of specimens taken from the human body. IVD products are devices as defined in section 201(h) of the Federal Food Drug and Cosmetic Act and may also be biological products subject to section 351 of the Public Health Service Act.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> "Other than the use of an approved drug in the course of medical practice" refers to a practitioner providing an approved drug to a patient because the practitioner believes the drug to be in the best interests of the patient. If the protocol specifies the use of the drug, it is not in the course of medical practice unless use of the drug is completely up to the discretion of the practitioner.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup> The investigator or other designated individual must maintain records of the product's delivery to the <u>clinical trial</u> site, the inventory at the site, the use by each subject, and the return to the sponsor or alternative disposition of unused products. These records include dates, quantities, batch or serial numbers, and expiration dates (if applicable), and the unique code numbers assigned to the investigational products and trial subjects. The investigator must maintain records that document adequately that the subjects are provided the doses specified by the protocol and reconcile all investigational products received from the sponsor.

	The <u>research</u> is not intended for immediate therapeutic, diagnostic, or preventive benefit to the study subject.
